Thank you for your participation in the U.S. Department of Education's (the Department) assessment peer review process under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA). I appreciate the efforts of the Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE) to prepare for the assessment peer review, which occurred in July 2020. Specifically, OSSE submitted evidence regarding its alternate assessments based on alternate academic achievement standards (AA-AAAS).

State assessment systems provide essential information that States, districts, principals and teachers can use to identify the academic needs of students, target resources and supports toward students who need them most, evaluate school and program effectiveness and close achievement gaps among students. A high-quality assessment system also provides useful information to parents about their children's advancement against and achievement of grade-level standards. The Department's peer review of State assessment systems is designed to provide feedback to States to support the development and administration of high-quality assessments.

Department staff carefully evaluated OSSE's submission and the Department found, based on the evidence received, that this component of your assessment system met the requirements of the ESEA. Based on the recommendations from this analysis of the State's submission, I have determined the following:

- Reading/language arts and mathematics AA-AAAS (Multi-State Alternate Assessment (MSAA)) in grades 3-8 and high school: **Meets the requirements of the ESEA.**

Congratulations on this significant accomplishment. Assessments that produce valid and reliable results are fundamental to a State's accountability system. Please be aware that approval of OSSE's assessments is not a determination that the system complies with Federal civil rights requirements, including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act, and requirements under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Also, please remember that, if OSSE makes significant changes in its assessments, the State must submit information about those changes to the Department for review and approval.

The Department placed a condition on OSSE's Title I, Part A grant award in January 2017. The condition stated that until OSSE provided all of the requested information from assessment peer reviews

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held in 2016, the condition would remain on the grant. This condition was also placed on OSSE's Title I, Part A grant award for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018, 2019, and 2020. Because all of the evidence has been resubmitted and approved in peer review, the Department is lifting this condition.

Thank you for your ongoing commitment to improving educational outcomes for all students. I look forward to our continued partnership as we move ahead with this critical work. I appreciate the work you are doing to improve your schools and provide a high-quality education for your students.
