ELSTAR Background

ELs in State Assessments and State Accountability Systems

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) includes important provisions related to the inclusion of ELs in state accountability systems:

- Long-term goals for increases in the percentage of ELs making progress in achieving English language proficiency (ELP), as measured by the statewide ELP assessment
- Measurements of interim progress toward meeting long-term goals
- A timeframe by which ELs are expected to attain ELP
- The use of ELP as a school-based measure in the state accountability system

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
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ELs in State Assessments and State Accountability Systems

In setting realistic timelines for the length of time it takes ELs to attain ELP, states can take into account individual and contextual characteristics that influence time to attainment.

Research studies have determined several individual and contextual characteristics that relate to EL students' progress toward and attainment of ELP including:

- Initial level of ELP
- Grade or age at school entry
- Time in the school system




ELs in State Assessments and State Accountability Systems

Improved data collection and analysis over the past decade has helped state educational agencies (SEAs) to examine longitudinally and better understand the pace at which ELs develop ELP.

Many states are currently leveraging these data to develop empirically grounded expectations for meeting the requirements of the ESEA. The ELSTAR is designed specifically to support states in examining data on ELs as part of these endeavors.

- The ELSTAR is a statistical analysis tool developed to support states and districts in analyzing EL data.
- ELSTAR can be used to:
 - Explore EL progress in attaining ELP
 - Analyze the influence of individual and contextual variables on EL student growth and attainment

Welcome to the English Learner State Accountability Resource!

The English Learner State Accountability Resource (ELSTAR) is a statistical analysis tool to support state education agency (SEA) leaders in making data-based decisions about English learner accountability, checking the validity and reliability of the ELP indicator, and technical assistance.

Use ELSTAR to run analyses such as:

- Exploring the statewide distribution of EL students and performance on content area and English Language proficiency assessments
- Determing what assessment results reveal about your English proficient performance standard
- Investigating trends in actual and expected annual ELP growth
- Informing exit criteria standards based on trends in time to achieve English Language proficiency



The ELSTAR Tool

- The ELSTAR tool is aligned with the <u>Handbook for</u> <u>Developing and Monitoring the ELP indicator and English</u> <u>Learner Progress (CCSSO, 2018)</u>
- It was developed as a companion to the Handbook to support states in developing an ELP Indicator, monitoring the functionality of the ELP Indicator, and evaluating the impact of EL programs on school and student success.



ELP Indicator Handbook

The CCSSO ELP Indicator Handbook describes:

- Procedures for developing an ELP Indicator that can be incorporated into a statewide accountability system
- Procedures for monitoring functionality of the ELP Indicator within the accountability system and its ability to provide useful descriptive information
- Procedures for evaluating the impact of EL programs on school and student success.
