AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN-OUTLYING AREAS STATE EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (ARP-OA SEA) OVERVIEW

- ARP-OA SEA funds made available through section 2005 of the ARP.
- Nearly \$850 million to SEAs in the OAs.
- ARP-OA SEA funds to be allocated not more than 30 calendar days after enactment of the ARP.



ARP-OA SEA FUNDING BREAKDOWN

- Funds were awarded to OA SEAs based on their respective shares of FY 2020 funds received under Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) in FY 2020.
- OA SEAs are required to allocate <u>not less than 20 percent</u> of funding to address the impact of lost instructional time by supporting the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as—
 - Summer learning or summer enrichment
 - Extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs or extended school year programs.



ARP-OA SEA FUNDING BREAKDOWN (CONT.)

- Ensure that interventions that address the impact of lost instructional time---
 - Respond to students' academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs
 - Address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on underrepresented student subgroups including by providing additional support to LEAs, as applicable, to fully address such impacts.
- An OA SEA may reserve a reasonable and necessary amount of its total ARP-OA SEA allocation for administrative costs as well as emergency needs as determined by the OA to address issues related to COVID-19.



ARP-OA SEA TIMELINE

- March 11 American Rescue Plan Act enacted
- April 6 Outlying Area allocations announced
- April 8 ARP-OA SEA funds awarded to each Outlying Area
- May 8 Deadline for Outlying Areas to post publicly on its website the plans for the safe return of in-person instruction and continuity of services consistent with the LEA plan required in section 2001(i) of the ARP (see Appendix B of the ARP-OA SEA grant award notification (GAN)
- June 7 ARP-OA SEA Implementation Plan template released
- June 14 Grantee webinar
- August 6 Deadline for submitting ARP-OA SEA Implementation Plans (email to esf.outlying@ed.gov)




THE OPPORTUNITY

DEVELOPING THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN



- Use of the implementation plan template is **not mandatory**; however, it is required that **all elements of the template** are addressed in the implementation plan the SEA submits.
- August 6: The SEA's implementation plan is due to the Department. Submit the implementation plan to ESF.Outlying@ed.gov
- July 23: Provide notification if SEA will not meet August 6 deadline due to State requirements that preclude submission by that date (e.g., because of pre-existing State board approval requirements). Provide notification at ESF.Outlying@ed.gov



SUPPORTING STUDENTS

2. Addressing Academic Impact of Lost Instructional Time

- Describe the plan to address academic impact of lost instructional time.
- The SEA is **required to use not less than twenty percent** of its ARP- OA SEA allocation to address the academic impact of lost instructional time.
- Evidence-based summer enrichment programs.
- Evidence-based extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs.
- Other programs to address the academic impact of lost instructional time (optional).



SUPPORTING STUDENTS

3. Administrative Costs and Emergency Needs

- SEA may reserve a reasonable and necessary amount of ARP-OA SEA allocation for administrative costs and the remainder for emergency needs as determined by the SEA.


