## Project Abstract

The American Institutes for Research® (AIR®), the Community Foundation of Great Flint (CFGF), Flint Community Schools (FCS), and the Genesee Intermediate School District (GISD) propose Ready, Set, Succeed: Kindergarten Transitions in Flint (RSS), an early-phase Education Innovation and Research project. The project addresses Absolute Priorities 1: Demonstrates a rationale and 4: Field-initiated innovations—Fostering knowledge and promoting the development of skills that prepare students to be informed, thoughtful, and productive individuals and citizens; and Competitive Preference Priorities 2: Addressing the impact of COVID-19 on underserved students and educators and 3: Promoting equity in student access to educational resources and opportunities. The project addresses challenges about how to authentically engage Black families and high-need students (i.e., low-income backgrounds, racially minoritized learners with unequal access to high-guality education) to support the kindergarten transition. Our innovation leverages the Flint Early Childhood Research-Program Partnership, a diverse coalition of partners (AIR, CFGF, Educare Flint, Cummings Great Expectations, FCS, and GISD). RSS consists of six components: (1) job embedded professional development focused on racial equity, (2) Building Bridges Meetings (joint PK-K), (3) Staff and Family Data Dialogues, (4) Parent–Provider Cafés, (5) Buddy Visits to K-12 settings, and (6) Direct Family Engagement/Advocacy Activities. Expected study outcomes include: (1) greater collaboration in the PK-12 system, (2) more culturally competent instruction, (3) improved advocacy skills for Black families, and (4) increased school readiness and positive racial identity.

The project has four objectives: (1) design the RSS intervention; (2) pilot RSS (3) test RSS for impact; and (4) analyze, report, and disseminate findings. We will test RSS impacts on **396 transitioning prekindergarten students, 370 families, and 228 educators** in Flint.
