Data Exchange Process

The California data-sharing agreement is between the California Department of Education as the State educational agency (SEA) and the California Department of Social Services as the child welfare agency (CWA). The data-sharing agreement was created in 2016 to support the calculation of the local control funding formula.⁴

The CWA shares data with the SEA weekly, and the process includes the following steps:



The CWA prepares the data. The CWA maintains the Child Welfare System/Case Management System, which contains information about children in foster care.



The CWA shares data with the SEA. The system sends data to the SEA using a secure file transfer protocol site. The SEA receives the CWA data and merges the data with the SEA data from the California Longitudinal Pupil Data System. The merge consists of a matching process based on name and date of birth of each child.



The SEA shares data with local educational agencies (LEAs). The exchanged data are made available to LEAs and schools, but the data are not actively shared with them. LEA and school staff must log into a State data system to retrieve the information about students in foster care and integrate the data into their local data systems.

Additionally, the SEA Analysis, Measurement, and Accountability Reporting Division shares merged data with the CWA once a year.

Drivers of Success

Some key facilitators that support the implementation of California's data-sharing agreement include:

- 1. An SEA-funded foster data liaison facilitates the data exchange by working with both the program staff and the data collection and analysis staff.
- 2. An umbrella memorandum of understanding (MOU) allows for quick changes to the data-sharing process as needed, such as when the State changes its definition of "foster care youth."
- 3. The use of the statewide CALPADS database, which contains high-quality data on student enrollment.



Future Opportunities

Several opportunities related to the implementation of the data-sharing agreement include:

- 1. Creating a linked database between the SEA and the CWA.
- 2. Ensuring timely updates to the CWA data (i.e., currently changes to individual foster care records can be added up to two weeks later).
- 3. Using a consistent definition of foster care between the SEA and the CWA.
