# Data Exchange Process

Michigan's data-sharing agreement is between the Michigan Department of Education as the State educational agency (SEA) and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services as the child welfare agency (CWA). The data-sharing agreement was created around 2011 to provide children in foster care with free and reduced-price lunch via the National School Lunch Program.

The data exchange process takes place every two weeks. The steps of this exchange are as follows:



**The CWA prepares the data. The** CWA uses MI Bridges as a case management system for social services for children in foster care. The data include information about the name and unique identifier code (UIC).



**The SEA and CWA exchange data.** The merging of the CWA and SEA data is completed by the Center for Educational Performance and Information (CEPI), a Michigan government agency. CEPI staff use the UIC and name to merge the CWA data with student enrollment information from the Michigan Student Data System.



**The SEA shares data with local educational agencies (LEAs).** CEPI maintains the direct certification report (csv file)<sup>6</sup> for each LEA that contains information on the number of children in foster care who are enrolled in school. Each LEA can then download its report. LEAs are required to do this at least three times a year but are instructed by the SEA to do it every two weeks.

# **Constant Success**

Some key facilitators that support the implementation of Michigan's data-sharing agreement include:

- The data exchange with the CWA is part of a larger set of data exchanges on student participation in social services. CEPI uses this larger data-sharing process to support direct certification for the National School Lunch Program due to participation in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and the Temporary Aid for Needy Families program.
- 2. The CEPI also has internal staff dedicated to monitoring and improving data quality.

# Future Opportunities

Several opportunities related to the implementation of the data-sharing agreement include:

- 1. Requiring LEAs to include foster care status in their local student information systems and allowing foster care liaisons to have access to the aggregated foster care report.
- Ensuring that students who move during the school year are accurately reflected in the direct certification report.
