Developing or Enhancing a Comprehensive Plan

to help school systems provide students with access to a well-rounded education and to improve school conditions for student learning by increasing socioeconomic diversity in safe, supportive and inclusive learning environments



02

Implementing a Comprehensive Plan

An applicant must propose to **develop or enhance**, and make publicly available, a **comprehensive plan**, which must include:



A description of how the applicant will develop or enhance a plan to increase socioeconomic diversity across the LEA or LEAs



A description of how the applicant will document and publicly disseminate the results of the funded project



A timeline and approach for conducting a comprehensive assessment of the geographic area to be served




A timeline and approach for family, student, community, and educator engagement to inform the development of the comprehensive plan



Action steps and a timeline to produce a comprehensive plan approved by district leadership

An applicant must propose to implement its existing high-quality comprehensive plan, which must:





Demonstrate that the comprehensive plan to increase socioeconomic diversity is based on rigorous family, student, community, and educator engagement



Document a commitment to ambitious, but achievable, goals for increasing socioeconomic diversity and transparent, published data analysis of progress relative to those goals







Comprehensive Plan – Explained




The comprehensive plan to increase socioeconomic diversity is the focus area of the Fostering Diverse Schools Program. Applicants will either be developing/enhancing a plan OR implementing a plan.

Comprehensive plan to increase socioeconomic diversity means a comprehensive plan (approved by an LEA's leadership) to:

- (a) Increase socioeconomic diversity within schools, classrooms, and educational programs, or courses or across and within school district(s), for the purpose of promoting academic achievement; and
- (b) Promote student academic achievement by fostering inclusive and welcoming learning environments that support the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students within classrooms and extracurricular activities in the district or districts and increase access to safe, healthy, and/or well-rounded educational opportunities.

Required Elements of the Comprehensive Plan







The application will be awarded based on applicants responding to the absolute priority, two application requirements, three **optional** competitive preference priorities, and seven selection criteria, described below.

I. Signed letters demonstrating broad community support for the proposal from at least five established community organizations representing diverse populations.

- **2.** A description of how the proposed project will be designed to improve student outcomes, including increased academic achievement, in schools served by the LEA(s) by doing either or both of the following:
- Increasing access to well-rounded educational opportunities
- · Supporting safe, healthy, and supportive school environments

Cross Agency Coordination & Community Engagement to Advance Systemic Change (up to 5 points)

Need for Project: Including (i) the magnitude or severity of the problem to be addressed; and (ii) the extent to which specific gaps or weaknesses in services, infrastructure, or opportunities have been identified and will be addressed by the proposed project, including the nature and magnitude of those gaps

10 points



Project Design: The extent to which: (i) goals, objectives, and outcomes are specified and measurable (ii) the design of the proposed project is appropriate to, and will successfully address, the needs of the target population; (iii) the project is designed to build capacity and yield results that will extend beyond period of federal funding (iv) project reflects up-to-date knowledge from research and effective practice (v) applicant demonstrates that is has resources to operate the project beyond the length of the grant.

25 points



Project Services: The quality and sufficiency of strategies for ensuring equal access and treatment for project participants who are members of groups that have traditionally been underrepresented, the likely impact of the services to be provided, and the extent to which the services provided are focused on those with the greatest need.

15 points



Project Personnel: The extent to which the applicant encourages applications for employment from persons who are members of groups that have been historically underrepresented and the qualifications, including relevant training and experience, of key project personnel.

10 points



Adequacy of Resources: The relevance and demonstrated commitment of each partner in the proposed project to the implementation and success of the project and the extent to which the costs are reasonable in relation to the objectives, design, and potential significance of the proposed project.

10 points



Management Plan: The adequacy of: (i) the management plan to achieve objectives on time and within budget, including responsibilities, timelines and milestones; (ii) procedures for ensure feedback and continuous improvement in the operation of the proposed project; and (iii) how the applicant will ensure that a diversity of perspectives are brought to bear in the operation of the proposed project.

20 points



Project Evaluation: The extent to which: (i) the methods of evaluation will provide valid and reliable performance data on relevant outcomes; and (ii) the methods of evaluation include the use of objective performance measures that are clearly related to the intended outcomes of the project.
