Re: Waiver Request from Section 317 of the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriation Act (CRRSA) and Section 2004 (a) of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP)

Dear Secretary Cardona,

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has continued to grow its investment in the areas of K-12 education and public higher education. Education funding in both sectors has grown by nearly \$1.4 billion in K-12 and \$100 million in public higher education. However, due to the unique definition of the Maintenance of Effort in ARP and CRRSA, which defines support in education as a percentage of overall state spending, Pennsylvania did not achieve compliance in FY2021-2022 for the K-12 and higher education sectors and does not anticipate meeting the requirement in FY2022-23 for the higher education sector.

The slight decline in education spending as a percentage of the overall budget is the result of an approximate 3.57% increase (\$3.6 billion) in the Human Services spending from the average of the three-year period between FY2017 and FY2019 to the spending in FY2022. That increase leveled off to around 1.45% in 2023, however it is still impacting education's share of the overall spending. The increase reflects the transition from multiple existing Medicaid fee-for-service delivery systems to a consolidated, capitated, managed long-term services and support system. While the program was a necessary investment to improve delivery services for our Commonwealth's most vulnerable populations, it has decreased the percentage of education spending relative to the overall state budget.

Enclosed is information containing details and explanations relative to Pennsylvania's compliance with other factors for the Secretary's consideration in granting the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania a waiver to the Maintenance of Effort provisions within CRRSA and ARP.

Factors in Determining the Commonwealth's Investments in K-12 and Higher Education For Consideration of Waiving Maintenance of Effort provisions within CRRSA and ARP

Pennsylvania has increased support for education over the last seven to eight years as indicated by the factors below.

Factor #1: Has Total State Funding for K-12 Education and for Higher Education increased from the prior fiscal year?

Response: Pennsylvania increased funding for K-12 and Higher Education for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22 when compared to FY2020-21 and FY2022-23 when compared to FY2021-22. The table below illustrates the percentage increases.

Factor #2: Has Total State funding for K-12 Education and for Higher Education increased over time (e.g., since baseline years)?
