Brief description of proposed project, including project activities: This proposal entails implementation at two schools, M.D. Fox Elementary School and Burr Middle School, during the first 3 years of the grant, and adding one additional school, Bulkeley High School, during years 4 and 5. This approach will allow an opportunity to study its impact on our students, review lessons learned, and ensure proper accountability strategies with a primary focus on fidelity to the model and performance at the level required by the Department of Education in order to be called Full-Service Community schools. This approach of developing three Full-Service Community Schools (M.D. Fox: PK – Grade 5, Burr Middle School: Grade 6- Grade 8, Bulkeley High School: Grades 9 – Grade 12) that are feeders for each other, will provide an opportunity to offer, track, and evaluate preparation of students at transition points. Each of the schools has at least three pipeline

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services in place currently. We will launch at least two additional pipeline services per school during the five-year project period, including programs in crime and violence prevention and intervention and in career readiness, and will apply our Multi-Tiered Systems of Support to identify and address students' needs, with a focus on key transition points (preschool to K, K to early elementary, elementary to middle school, and middle school to high school.

Summary of project objectives and expected outcomes: Objectives are to enhance our system of student supports; expand in-school and out-of-school programs and activities; increase involvement of families and community; and build our capacity for collaborative leadership and professional development. Outcomes include: increased access of tier 2 and tier 3 students to in- and ou-of-school supports; expand in and out-of-school activities and programs targeting tier 2 and tier 3 students to develop competencies and transferable skills aligned to the academic curriculum; engage tier 2 and tier 3 students and families in community activities and increase families' involvement in their children's education; and implement a permanent 3 tier network approach that will include District, School administration, teachers, students, families, and community-based organizations in order to further expand collaborative leadership and professional development.
